

2011 Earth Cleanup THE BIGGEST IN LRNOW HISTORY

The section of the eastern branch of the Lynnhaven River along S. Lynnhaven Road is heavily populated and well hidden. The river quietly twists its way under Lynnhaven Parkway, past Lynnhaven Mall, past Brookwood Elementary School and Plaza Middle School and out towards Potters Road – a forgotten stretch of waterway. A new interest in this section of London Bridge Creek, now to be included in the Southeast Coast Paddling Trail, led the



was in full swing. Teacher Karen Roberts led students from Brookwood Elementary School. Older siblings from Plaza Middle came back to assist and worked with a crew from Mechdyne Corporation and other dedicated LRN volunteers to remove more than 120 bags of trash, small and large appliances, dog crates, sports equipment, auto parts, home and construction debris, car seats, seven shopping carts, pallets, patio furniture, paint cans and more

LRNow Stewardship and Access Committee to launch a massive effort to clean up of the area. Whit Peace, Cleanup Coordinator and Co-chair of the Stewardship and Access Committee, rallied approximately 75 volunteers who launched the cleanup from three different locations. Kayaks and canoes left from the north and south cleaning the shorelines as they went to meet in the middle at Brookwood Elementary where a land-based cleanup

which was modestly estimated at more than 5,000 pounds.

The Greening of the Oyster Roast

At LRNow, we always try to walk the talk. We have a rain barrel and a native plant garden in front of our office, we carpool whenever possible, are trying to reduce the amount of paper we use and minimize our footprint any way that we can. With that in mind, we have worked hard to "green" our Oyster Roast. We use reusable cups and glasses, compostable plates made from sugar cane, reusable cloth table linens and try to get as much of our food from local sources as possible. We recycle all of the oyster shells, soda cans and wine bottles. At the end of this year's Oyster Roast with a record crowd of 500 people, we had only eight bags of trash. That's not bad! Maybe next year, we can get it down to five or six.

You Can Be an Oyster Gardener

Have you wondered how you might get more involved with Lynnhaven River restoration? Oyster Gardening may be just the opportunity that you have been looking for. It takes about an hour of time each month to keep your oyster bag clean and healthy and your baby oysters will help greatly to rebuild our oyster population in the Lynnhaven River. How does oyster gardening work? As an oyster gardener, you will receive 1,000 baby seed oysters this summer. When you receive them, each will be about the size of your thumbnail. You grow these oysters in a mesh bag in a Taylor float in the Lynnhaven for one year. At the end of that year, each will be between one and three inches in length. Next summer, you will turn them in at an Oyster Roundup. They will be placed on conservation reefs in the Lynnhaven and you will receive a new batch of baby oysters for the coming year. How do I get started?

- 1. To get started, you will need a place to keep your oysters. That may be at your own dock if you are lucky enough to live on the water or you may ask a friend, neighbor or a marina if you can tie your float to their dock.
- 2. Once you have a location secured, you should request an information packet about oyster gardening for restoration by contacting Chesapeake Bay Foundation's Hampton Roads office at 757-622-1964 or hamptonroads@cbf.org. This packet includes general information about the Citizen Oyster Gardening program, the need for oyster restoration, the materials required, and a required State Registration Form. (If you are a teacher, contact our office, 757-962-5398 or oysterreefkeeper@yahoo.com about Oyster Gardening workshops and opportunities for teachers.)
- 3. Attend one of our Taylor Float Workshops (Thursday, August 4 or Thursday, August 25, 6:00-7:30 pm) to build your own Taylor Float or order an assembled Taylor Float through the LRNow office (757-962-5398 or office@lynnhaven2007.com).
- 4. Register and attend a New Citizen Oyster Gardener Workshop (Tuesday, August 9 or Tuesday, August 30, 6:00-7:30 pm) to learn about oyster gardening and pick up your new seed oysters. Sign up early because space is limited; register at 757-622-1964 or hamptonroads@cbf.org. There is a suggested donation to CBF of \$30 per 1,000 oysters.
- 5. Next summer you will turn in your one-year-olds at a Roundup and get your new baby oysters. Please contact our office if you have any questions. This past year, we had a nice increase to Oyster Gardeners in the Lynnhaven. Let's see if we can increase that number even more this year!



The work at Lynnhaven River NOW is centered around our various committees. Each committee has a different area of focus and offers volunteers an opportunity to get involved in the area that most interests them. A complete list of committees is available on our website. In each of our upcoming newsletters, I would like to focus on one of our committees so you can learn more about their great work. In this issue, we are highlighting the great work of the Stewardship and Access Committee.

This hard working group is focused on promoting access, enjoyment and stewardship of the Lynnhaven River. The activities that they organize include our many river cleanups, the bike tours, the kayak tours, our adopt-a-spot locations and working with the City to develop additional sites on the Lynnhaven for the public to have access to the river.

The Stewardship and Access Committee is led by Lillie Gilbert and Whit Peace and during the past year they have organized and sponsored:

Twelve river cleanup days including a huge cleanup with three sites and 75 volunteers on April 30th and our many Clean the Bay Day groups.

A very successful Third Annual Bayside History Day Bike Tour with 53 participants.

Paddle into History Kayak Tour on the anniversary of the ducking of the Witch of Pungo.

Regular cleanups at our two adopt-a-spots: Hutton Circle Canoe & Kayak Launch site and Birdneck Canoe & Kayak Launch site.

During the first five months of 2011, through the river cleanups 300 volunteers have donated 706 hours of time and picked up 13,910 pounds of trash!

This committee knows that everyone needs an opportunity to get out on the water, to enjoy and appreciate the beautiful Lynnhaven River and to learn to be a better steward of the river. If you can get excited about the idea of providing opportunities for people to enjoy the river and practice good stewardship, join us at one of the committee meetings on the 4th Friday of each month at 8:30 am at the Colonial Education Center at the Lynnhaven House on Wishart Road.
