

The Great Blue Heron

Great Blue Herons grace our Lynnhaven River waterways. They are stately and beautiful. Read these facts about the Great Blue Heron and color the picture below. Then the next time you are near the water, look for a beautiful Great Blue Heron.

- It is the largest heron in North America. Its head to tail length is 33 to 55 inches and its wing span is 66 to 79 inches.
- They nest in trees and bushes.
- Its primary food is small fish, but it also eats shrimp, crabs, aquatic insects, rodents, small mammals, amphibians, reptiles and small birds.



- They breed in colonies, in trees close to wetlands. The female lays three to six pale blue eggs and raises one brood each year.
- In flight, the Great Blue Heron curls its neck into a tight "S" shape.
- Hunting Great Blue Herons wade slowly or stand statue-like, stalking fish and other prey in shallow water or open fields.
